She had obviously not been fed during the time she was there and was filthy and painfully thin, but ever so friendly. She spent a few days at Animal Welfare, was cleaned up nicely, sterilised and has now found a new home where all the animals are obviously loved and well cared for and as you can see from the photo is flourishing!

FUR ON 5th

A new organization - Fur on 5th - The Voice of the Animals cc - has been established by founder members Sonette Robberts and Jane King. They operate from the old Animal Welfare Shop at 63A 5th Ave Newton Park. Fur on 5th's mission is to assist various animal charities in PE in the fight against animal injustice and cruelty, and is committed to donate to various charities in any small way that they can.

They operate on donations of unwanted goods. Once they have covered their costs, they donate to various animal charities, therefore operating not for profit, but to assist the animals. Cat Care has already received 4 donations from Fur on 5th.

RESCUED AND IN NEED OF A LOVING HOME

This poor boy was a proper lap cat, the lady who called us said he used to be fat and was always happily lazing around on his owners couch. Then one day 3 months ago his owners decided to move out of the granny flat and leave him behind and this is what is left of him. Our "Cat Care Ranger", Cheryl Burger, says when she trapped him he was so thin that he could barely keep up his own weight! All calicos are tortoiseshell (as they carry both black and red), but not all tortoishell are calicos (which requires a significant amount of white in the fur and patching rather then mottling of the colours). The calico is sometimes also called a tricolour cat. A true tricolour cat must consist of three colours: a reddish colour, dark or light, white, and one other colour, typically a brown, black or blue. Both tortoishell and calico cats are typically female because the coat pattern is the result of differential X chromosome inactivation in females (which, as with all normal female mammals, have two X chromosomes). Conversely, cats where the overall colour is ginger (orange) or commonly male (roughly in a 3:1 ration). In a litter sired by a ginger tom, the females will be tortoishell or ginger. Male tortoiseshells can occur as a result of chromosomal abnormalities (often lined to sterility) or by a phenomenon knows as mosaicism, where two early stage embryos are merged into a single kitten.

TRAIN STATION COLONY

These kitties live at the train station. They have all been sterilised and Cheryl Burger feeds them daily. The white cats unfortunately have terrible skin problems

but Cheryl keeps a close eye on them.







HAPPY ENDING FOR ST ALBANS KITTY

This beautiful cat belonged to Mr Kruger who was senselessly murdered out at St Albans. Anthea Taylor had met Mr Kruger 5 weeks before the tragedy and on visiting him at his place for the first time, met Katz. Katz is semi-feral and had a bad skin condition and he asked Anthea if she would please help him get her treatment, which Anthea promised him she would do.

This was a week before the tragedy, after the murder Anthea went out to St Albans to try and find Katz, with no success. Anthea never gave up and also enlisted the help of Natalie and Vernon of Cat Care. It wasn't long and Anthea had tracked Katz down, she had been picked up by a friend of Mr Kruger's mom. Katz, now known as Kate, who is 8 years old, is living happily with Anthea and her skin problems are nearly something of the past. Well done to everyone involved in changing the destiny of one little semi-feral.




